Elmer Layer immediately climbed up the pole and brought Hoover down with the block and tackle, assisted by Robert Stew-ard. Layer was forced to cut Hoover's safety belt loose from the pole before he could be low-

Attempts to Revive Failed

On the ground he was wrapped in blankets and artificial respiration was administered. Aid was summoned from Rockford and Lowell and respirators were brought and used to start breathterworth hospital in Grand Rapis with a police escort and al-

Fatally Stricken

Lowell-Leo Hoover, 37, father four school-age daughters, was lead on, arrival at Butterworth hospital Tuesday morning after coming in contact with a 6,900-volt nower line owned by the Lowell' light & Power Co.

The accident occurred while Hoover and employes of the municipalight plant were installing a new transformer at Five-Mile rd. and McCabe rd., about one and one-half miles; southeast of Townsend park.

A transformer had burned out

Monday evening.

Robert Stewart, who with Elmerlayer, were installing the new transformer, said the Hoover was on the pole when he came in contact with the 5,300-volt line. The force of the Mock knocked Hoover free from the wire, but he swung back against it, again being knocked free. Hoover was knocked unconscious. Stewart climbed the role and cut Hoover from his mbing harness and lowered him .. the ground.

Hoover was administered oxygen at the scene and a Blanchard ambulance was summoned to take the unconscious man to Butterworth hospital.
